

**CALIFORNIA NORTHERN COASTAL AREA (CNCA 06)
PRE-CONFERENCE ASSEMBLY MINUTES
APRIL 11 - 12, 2026**

The Pre-Conference Assembly business meeting of CNCA was held on April 11, 2026, with virtual attendees on Zoom and in-person attendees at the Petaluma Veterans Building in Petaluma, CA. An Assembly Orientation was presented by Joann L., Panel 67 Delegate. Drew B. opened the meeting at 9:10 a.m., followed by the Serenity Prayer. The AA Preamble was read in Spanish by Dulce M. (District 19). Ramona A. (District 40) read the Twelve Traditions in Spanish, and Jessie B. (District 15) read the Twelve Concepts in English. Five past Delegates were present: Bob D. (Panel 36, Area 28), Barbara M. (Panel 41), Ken M. (Panel 61), Joann L. (Panel 67), and Eric L. (Panel 73). Five past Area Officers were present: Judy W., Magdaleno O., Margarete V.A., Michael Q., and Miguel H. Four visitors from Area 07 were also in attendance, including Claudio B. (Delegate, Panel 76) and Holly J. (Alternate Delegate, Panel 76). The 2025 Fall Assembly business meeting minutes were accepted as published in the December 2025 *CNCA Comments and Comentaríos*.

Saturday Registered Attendance: 457 total (387 in-person; 70 online). 320 voting members (265 in-person; 55 online) / 137 non-voting (122 in-person; 15 online).

OFFICER REPORTS

DELEGATE – CHITRA S.: Since returning from the General Service Conference a year ago, I've had a huge spiritual experience, and it's not what I thought it was going to be. It's been messy and magic. No matter how long we've worked a program, we are alcoholic: beautifully insane and also brilliant. We have to take care of ourselves daily and follow the principles laid out in the steps, traditions, and concepts, or else stay restless, irritable, and discontent. The group conscience process has shown me the God of it all – the beauty and the intelligence – in the mess. As alcoholics, we just need to feel safe enough to be ourselves. Our best thinking does not come in a sterile, perfectly behaved environment. We are emotional, colorful, and dramatic, and the way we connect dots is inspirational. We come from a place of pain and fear, and need love and acceptance more than anything. We get this by learning to listen without reacting, just sitting, letting each other share what is true for us. My "right" and your "right" can be different, and we can get along just by hearing each other. We don't need to change or fix anyone. Welcome to two days of spiritual training, learning that uncomfortable can be safe. We're not here for perfection; we're here for development. Let's begin our spiritual bootcamp.

ALTERNATE DELEGATE – CLAUDIA N.: As Alternate, my responsibility is to support the Delegate in whatever way is needed. Today, that means taking copious notes to capture the information she will carry into the Conference. Hearing all of you share from your districts, groups, and committees this past month has filled me with hope for A.A.'s future. By taking part in the Conference process and ensuring our groups remain the true voice of A.A. as a whole, we help our fellowship grow and better reach the alcoholic who still suffers. At PRAASA, the recurring theme was that we need to reach out more to professionals and be more visible, and the Agenda Topic process is a mechanism we use to find solutions. When I got to A.A., all I wanted was to stop hurting and stay sober, and what I received was so much more. Service not only sustains A.A.; it transforms the lives of the members who participate in it.

CHAIR – DREW B.: Welcome to the "Super Bowl of General Service": our Pre-Conference Assembly, where our groups gather to share their collective conscience on the future of our fellowship. Our founders began with the Oxford Group, seeking divine guidance through silent meditation. Still, as our fellowship evolved, we moved from individual dictation toward collective wisdom, codified in Tradition Two: our ultimate authority is a loving God as expressed through the group conscience. A true group conscience is not a simple majority vote. We strive for substantial unanimity; we inform ourselves, listen intently, and prioritize the minority opinion. The goal isn't for one side to win; this is a spiritual exercise in setting aside personal ambition to find a solution the entire fellowship can live with. We have Old Business for a potential vote and New Business for discussion. Please take this opportunity to build some A.A. unity and have fun.

TREASURER – DAN B.: March YTD, we are doing well financially. We received \$39,000 in income, including group and district contributions and 7th Tradition at ACMs and assemblies, and \$30,000 in expenses for officer, assembly, committee, and administrative costs, leaving approximately \$10,000 in net revenue before upcoming assemblies. Our checking account currently holds \$22,000. GSO has begun releasing monthly communications on Self-Support, and I hope to schedule an area sharing session on this topic in June. We will be using Venmo to collect the 7th Tradition and are looking into a Venmo for Nonprofit account. This assembly costs approximately \$10,000, and expenses include site rental, food, tables, chairs, coffee, utensils, and decorations. Assemblies are expensive, worth every penny, and we have a responsibility to fully self-support them, including those who join us by Zoom. Please be generous with your contributions at cnca06.org/contribute.

ASSEMBLY COORDINATOR – MATT E.: Congratulations to Chase C. on your new service position. I will be working closely with them over the next month to complete a thorough pass-it-on, and have invited them to shadow me at the Post-Conference Assembly. My last day as Assembly Coordinator will be at the May 2026 ACM. I will save the waterworks for the Post-Conference Assembly on May 16 in Vacaville. For now, take a look around and make some noise for today's host, District 10 Marin. If you want to throw a party like this for 300 of your General Service friends, we are still seeking districts

to bid on the Pre- and Post-Conference Assemblies in 2027. Please email assemblycoordinator@cnca06.org to discuss how to get started.

REGISTRAR – SARAH B.: When it comes to the 76th Conference theme, "Humility in Action," my role is being a steward of group data. Our Area has 1,700 active groups, including 42 new ones. However, only 24% have registered GSRs, and 780 groups remain "Unknown" or "Incomplete." Thank you so much for being here to ensure the voices of your group are heard through Concept IV, and thank you to all who contribute to keeping our records up to date and our groups connected. My focus remains on accuracy and unity.

RECORDING SECRETARY – JACKIE B.: I'd like to reflect on a topic that has impacted my service this past year: the growing use of AI across intergroups, committees, and districts to supplement or fully replace the work of a recording secretary. AI works like phone autocomplete, predicting the next word based on patterns in billions of pages of text. It doesn't know anything; it is very good at guessing what comes next. "Sounds accurate" and "is accurate" are crucial distinctions, and that distinction is everything. The Recording Secretary's essential role is to record what actually happened. I take notes and audio recordings, work from transcriptions, and use AI to help summarize and distill them, but the source of truth is always me. AI is a tool of efficiency, not a replacement for the trusted servant.

LITERATURE/GRAPEVINE/LA VIÑA – JOSE L.: AAWS will implement new list prices for digital downloads, including e-books and audiobooks, effective May 4, 2026, following approval by the AAWS Board on March 6. The price of *A.A. in Prison* will remain at \$2.99. This continues the effort to establish normalized list prices across all literature formats. Previous digital price increases occurred in 2022 and 2023; print materials, CDs, and DVDs were updated effective February 1, 2026. A.A. Grapevine is adopting a new subscription management system and asks for patience with brief delays for new print subscriptions; contact customer service for urgent matters. Each week, the Grapevine holds an open virtual A.A. meeting, recorded as a podcast and now available on major podcast platforms. The April issue of the Grapevine, "Getting into General Service," features member stories about getting into service below the group level and how it changed their sobriety.

AREA STANDING & SUB-COMMITTEES, SHARING SESSIONS, AND LIAISON REPORTS

ACCESSIBILITIES – ENRIQUE E.: Removing barriers to access is being actively pursued at GSO, and our Area is fully participating in these efforts. Please visit our table, where service materials can help you understand the work being done. Our committee has a lot of work ahead of us, including conducting Accessibilities and Safety Workshops for host districts. Your participation is important, and we are grateful for the support of districts, especially those members who travel far to attend workshops. Please make yourself available for an Accessibilities position in your district; it would mean a great deal.

ARCHIVES – ELVIA P.: DCMCs are encouraged to check in with their District Archivists; we want to complete the Archives District Flip Chart for display at events. If your district lacks an Archivist or Archives Representative, please bring it up at your next meeting. We urgently need an assistant to our Digital Systems Administrator (DSA). If the current DSA rotates out at the end of this panel with no replacement, the Area Archives will be at a standstill. The position requires attending the monthly workday in person in Walnut Creek. Our monthly business meeting may be attended on Zoom. Email archiveschair@cnca06.org for more information.

BRIDGING THE GAP (BTG) – LYNN K.: Bridging the Gap is a Twelve-Step committee at the district and area levels whose volunteers take presentations into rehabs, detox facilities, shelters, hospitals, jails, and prisons, and accompany newly released newcomers to their first few meetings in their home community. So far this year, our districts have reported 131 presentations, 337 requests for contact, 56 new volunteers, and 27 successful bridges. A bridge means we contacted someone and actually accompanied them to their first few meetings.

FINANCE – JEFF D. (READ BY RODRIGO Z.): The Finance Committee is tasked with ensuring that the intent and spirit of the Seventh Tradition direct management of the budget, with a constant review of contributions and expenses and prudence as our guide. As the treasurer's figures demonstrate, the Area enjoys a solid financial position. The Treasurer, in collaboration with the Finance Committee, will organize a workshop for treasurers with special emphasis on the various levels of responsibility within General Service. The initial workshop has been proposed for June.

I&T (INTERPRETATION AND TRANSLATION) – LUIS R. (READ BY MEGAN M.): Our committee meets monthly and reports at each ACM to ensure all members have access to Area information by bridging language barriers. We translate approximately 20 to 30 documents each month, including the *CNCA Comments* and *Comentarios*, using DeepL software, and edit to reflect A.A.-appropriate language. We also provide American Sign Language (ASL) and simultaneous radio interpretation for English and Spanish sessions. Thank you to the interpreters supporting today's session.

PI/CPC (PUBLIC INFORMATION / COOPERATION WITH THE PROFESSIONAL COMMUNITY) – CLAUDIA N.: Public Information (PI) informs the community about A.A. and alcoholism, while Cooperation with the Professional Community (CPC) provides information to those who work with alcoholics professionally, covering where we are, what we are, and what we can and cannot do. The Area PI/CPC Committee meets every fourth Saturday at 9 a.m. in Petaluma. Recent outreach has included contacts regarding upcoming exhibits, literature for hospitals, and resources for starting meetings in supportive housing.

TECHNOLOGY – MEG B.: The Tech Committee trialed DirectPoll voting software and invites feedback for its use at the upcoming Election Assembly. QR code resource sheets for GSRs are now available in English and Spanish; four districts have already received customized versions. Most notably, the Area Tech Team and SF/Marin Intergroup will co-

host the [National A.A. Technology Workshop \(NAATW\)](#) on September 9 - 11, 2026, at the Concord Hilton in Concord, CA. This hybrid event will include Spanish interpretation. Volunteers are needed for in-house tech support. The next planning meeting is on April 22 at 7 p.m. via Zoom. Contact tech@cnca06.org with presentation ideas.

WEBSITE – SANDRA S.: The Web Committee maintains information and communication on the cnca06.org website and has made major changes since the Fall Assembly to improve usability. In March, we updated most English and Spanish pages to display one language at a time; the Events Calendar will follow by June. The 2026 [Agenda Topics Summaries](#) are posted on a password-protected page; contact your DCM, DCMC, or chair@cnca06.org for the password. The committee continues to research Lovable, an AI-based platform, as a potential alternative to WordPress. Contact webchair@cnca06.org with questions or to report errors.

YPAA (YOUNG PEOPLE IN A.A.) – WILL L. AND JAMAL M.: YPAA Committees from Marin, East Bay, Sacramento, and Santa Cruz are participating this weekend and being of service by selling bottled water and sodas. [SOCYPAA \(Sonoma County Young People in A.A.\)](#) is hosting a comedy show on May 23 at the Center for Spiritual Living in Santa Rosa; all proceeds benefit the General Service Board and AA World Service. If your local Young People's committee has gone inactive or doesn't exist, please talk to us; we'll help with elections, bylaws, and building a connection to General Service. [EBYPAA's \(East Bay Young People in A.A.\)](#) annual Yuba Campout runs July 10–12 at Scott's Flat Campground in Nevada City, CA.

SPANISH LINGUISTIC SHARING SESSION – JAVIER G.: The Spanish Linguistic Sharing Session is held at each ACM at 10 a.m. The session includes a coordinator, a presenter who speaks for ten minutes on a service topic, and a secretary who takes notes and reports at each meeting. Coordinators and presenters rotate each session. Following the presentation, all members share. New Spanish-speaking GSRs who have not yet attended an ACM are especially encouraged to participate.

AREA BUSINESS

OLD BUSINESS

- That CNCA06 request that A.A. produce a public information service piece with a simple and consistent message, including QR codes, that could be used across the United States/Canada service structure. And to request that AA use the service piece in a public information campaign. — *Presented by District 01 Monterey.*

Discussion Summary: *Group Consciences:* Groups were generally supportive of the intent but divided on whether public information pieces with QR codes should be produced at the AAWS level or locally. One district reported full support for the motion. The Tech Committee supported the intent but preferred local creation. One group questioned the definition of a "service piece" and flagged the risk of a dangerous precedent, including opportunities for scams. That group's sole minority opinion was enthusiasm for anything that actively reaches out to alcoholics to carry the message,

citing the 24-hour hotline as an example. *Personal Opinions:* The discussion reflected a tension between those who see a GSO-produced QR code piece as an overdue tool to reach struggling alcoholics and those who raised concerns about anonymity, safety, and the sufficiency of existing resources and local service structures. The discussion opened with a member sharing Bill W.'s 1960 General Service Conference talk, in which he emphasized the need to reach the sea of drunks through better public relations and called for openness to changing communication methods. The speaker connected this to a 30-year stagnation of A.A.'s worldwide membership. Another speaker questioned whether the focus should be on unity rather than membership numbers. Supporters argued that a GSO-produced piece would spread faster than waiting for every local intergroup to create one, would serve as one tool among many that groups and committees can use or set aside as they choose, and would attract young people who rely on phones rather than pamphlets, as well as non-English speakers. A member reminded the assembly that there are rural and remote places without local Intergroup or General Service committees to create these materials. A supporter recounted seeing a QR code for Al-Anon and said A.A. is behind other 12-step fellowships. Another shared an encounter with a public QR code sticker for a national alcohol addiction hotline that recommended therapy instead of A.A. Opponents raised concerns about anonymity and safety, noting that government agencies warn against scanning public QR codes because they could be phishing scams. One member emphasized that "all technology comes at a price." A DCMC reminded the assembly that existing digital PI cards are already available on aa.org/pi-service-cards, allowing local committees to add their own QR codes and local hotline numbers, and that what is needed is boots on the ground rather than new materials. Another stressed that no service piece, however clear, will be effective without cultivating relationships with outside entities willing to display them. One opponent argued that Area 06 itself has the resources and know-how to lead this effort.

NEW BUSINESS

- That CNCA 06 support Area 93's Proposed Agenda Item to make their Alcoholics Anonymous Safety Training Video, in both English and Spanish, with a French option to be developed, available to the General Service Board for consideration in the process of conference-approved service material. – *Presented by CNCA 06 Delegate, Chitra S, Panel 75 <<Tabled due to 2026 Agenda Item Treatment and Accessibilities Item E.>>*
- That CNCA submit to the General Service Conference a motion to change the phrase "Power greater than themselves" from page 165 of the *Plain Language Big Book* back to the original phrase "unsuspected inner resource" from page 567 of the "Spiritual Experience" in the original Big Book – *Presented by District 11 Napa*

Discussion Summary:

Group Consciences: Most groups favored returning to the original phrase, though reasoning varied. One with many agnostic and atheist members strongly supported it, finding it helpful with atheist and agnostic newcomers using the *Plain Language Big Book* (PLBB). Another felt the original was more spiritual and didn't impose a specific higher power, working for atheists, agnostics, and believers. A sub-district was all in favor. An Oldtimers group, opposed to the entire PLBB, didn't want the original Big Book changed. The Spanish district and groups had no opinion, as the PLBB is in English. One group favored it, believing members intelligent enough to grasp "unsuspected inner resource."

Personal Opinions: Members expressed a range of views, with opinions divided between preserving plain language accessibility and restoring what some consider essential spiritual nuance. Several members favored leaving the PLBB as is, noting that it is a translation while the original Big Book retains the original language, and that "unsuspected inner resource" does not sound like plain language. Others argued that the translation lost serious meaning and important nuance, and they supported a change, whether back to the original or to a better translation. Members who fully support the PLBB still felt the original phrase is a doorway, particularly for Buddhists and non-deists, acknowledging that A.A. is both inclusive and heavily based in Judeo-Christianity. One member recalled that as a newcomer the word "inner" caught her heart because it showed her recovery is an inside job, and another called the phrase one of the most important phrases in all of A.A. In contrast, a supporter of the motion found "power greater than themselves" easier to understand, saying it was important for the power to be outside of themselves, and that the purpose of the program is to connect to a higher power. One member offered a distinct minority opinion that he has to be careful about listening to the voices inside him because they have often gotten him in trouble, and added that "power greater than ourselves" does not necessarily mean God, but can mean a room full of other people. Practical concerns were raised that changing the phrase would require altering the following sentence to link it, and that the motion's wording may not achieve what it seeks. A Hispanic member noted that the Spanish Big Book does not have a translation of "inner resource" and instead uses higher power in that section. <<**Motion to become Old Business at the Post Conference Assembly on May 16, 2026.**>>

The Pre-Conference Assembly business meeting was closed at 12:00 p.m. by Drew B. with the Responsibility Declaration. The Assembly reconvened at 1:00 p.m. with a sharing session on the 76th General Service Conference Theme, "Humility in Action", followed by the sharing of group consciences on Agenda Topics.

Digest: Publishing digital PDFs generates no income for AAWS yet still requires formatting, editing, and copyright expenses, and gets used by third-party apps like Everything AA, unlike print and e-book publishing, which generates income. // The Everything AA app creator recently asked users for donations, so since we bought the Meeting Guide app, maybe we could buy Everything AA, control it, and make it subscription based. // I love the [Primary Purpose podcast](#), especially Season 2 Episode 1 about the International in Vancouver. A member from our Area was on another episode

about how a pamphlet is created, and I also enjoy the Grapevine podcast. // Save the date for the 13th annual [National AA Technology Workshop \(NAATW\)](#), a hybrid event September 11 - 13 at the Concord Hilton, co-hosted by Area 06 Tech Committee and San Francisco Marin Intergroup, with planning meetings on the fourth Wednesday of the month at 7 p.m. on Zoom. Email techchair@cnca06.org for more information. // The [La Viña 30th Anniversary](#) is July 24 - 25 in Tacoma, Washington, and we have coffee mugs, thermoses, and t-shirts to support it. // I see a lack of sponsorship for newcomers, and we talk a lot about pamphlets and books, but not about the steps. // Cash contributions today were \$1,785 and Venmo contributions were \$1,590.70, for a grand total of \$3,375.70. // It's my first time being of service, and I feel good. // Group members always want to know how much something costs, but I think we need to ask first if there is a need, because if there is, A.A. will figure out how to pay for it. // There was a coffee shortage this morning. The literature committee would be better served by a regular rotation of updates rather than responding to fellowship requests word by word or sentence by sentence, and the same goes for the technology. // [EBYPAA \(East Bay Young People in A.A.\)](#) is hosting our annual [Yuba Campout](#) conference July 10 - 12, with an incredible speaker lineup, a lake for swimming, and preregistration at \$30. // I got hooked on General Service at the PRAASA a decade ago, I want to thank Chitra for taking what our group said to New York. My partner passed away on January 12. Thank you for the outpouring of love from the Area and my District when I fell apart. // The membership survey hasn't changed in 30 years, and we only have 2 million members, so we need a paradigm shift. // It fills me with joy because there is no time left to think about alcohol or drugs when there is the joy of living. // Every summer, Lake County hosts [Soberest](#), a three-day campout. This year it will take place on Cobb Mountain at Pine Grove Road Resort on July 17 - 19. // I'm honored to serve as the alternate DCMC for District 70. Congratulations to my DCMC Chase for being elected to an area position. For me humility in action is receiving all the love and support I did today. // I am new to A.A., I like this way of life, I want to keep giving it my all, and happy 24 hours.

Drew B. opened the meeting at 9:00 a.m. with the Serenity Prayer, followed by the sharing of group consciences on Agenda Topics.

Sunday Registered Attendance: 268 total (202 in-person; 66 online). 210 voting members (150 in-person; 60 online) / 58 non-voting (52 in-person; 6 online).

Total Registered Attendance: 725 total (589 in-person; 136 online). 530 voting members (415 in-person; 115 online) / 195 non-voting (174 in-person; 21 online).

WHAT'S ON YOUR MIND? (SUNDAY SESSION)

Digest: I would like to hear thoughts from past delegates and officers on the Equitable

Distribution of Workload (EDW) Agenda Topics, as we learn from them, and I'm missing that now that we no longer hear personal opinions. // What's on my mind is promotion rather than attraction, because my fifteen-year-old son's friend was in a drunk driving crash over the weekend, and my son doesn't understand why we don't go into schools and talk more, so let's get into the schools. // My pet peeve with the General Service Board is that topics submitted by individuals get through while a topic passed by our large Area was rejected, so I think only active delegates should submit agenda topics as individuals, so the crazy alcoholic has to talk to one other person first. // I was reflecting today that this is like the trolley problem in action. // As a first-time GSR, I have a new appreciation for what goes on to keep A.A. active and fresh. // The Foro Hispano will be celebrated in October, and the Spanish linguistic districts have already started preparing for it. // This has been such an experience, and it's been a hard time for me health-wise, so being able to attend online has meant a lot. // Please attend the [National AA Technology Workshop \(NAATW\)](#) this year, which will be hybrid and dual language in Spanish and English for the first time, September 11 - 13 in Concord. // At every Pre-Conference Assembly, I hear people who agree with me and those who disagree, but I learn so much and love how our Area thoroughly informs our Delegate. // If you want to be involved in planning for the NAATW, we're having planning committee meetings on the fourth Wednesday of the month at 7 p.m., including April 22, online only. Email techchair@cnca06.org. I also want to give a shout-out to our hybrid team, the light box, the mic monitors, and Chitra. // The comments made around removing Dr. Bob's quote from the service manual felt like a form of bullying to me, and how we treat each other matters, because we might dissuade others from bringing ideas forward for fear of that kind of treatment. // I've been thinking about Mr. Rogers' quote to look for the helpers when the news is scary, and coming here and seeing all the helpers showing up to love each other and make the world better has filled me up. // The time we get to cover these topics in our groups is so limited that it's hard to have thorough discussions, so a little more time to get a truly informed conscience would be great. // Thank you to Jose and District 18 for making lunch. // Today's contributions were \$1,091, added to yesterday's for a total of \$4,476.70. // A.A. is a service body, not a business, and we love talking about money and how other people should spend it, but my experience was that when other people dictated when I should get sober, it didn't have a positive effect. // I like the idea of a board off to the side showing what's coming up next and what just finished, because I sometimes get lost and some visual orientation would help. // As Area Assembly Coordinator, I want to give a giant round of applause to District 18 and District 10, because the host committee co-chairs, Alan and Steven, absolutely crushed it with an incredible team of volunteers. // As a host co-chair, I want to thank you all for this life-changing opportunity for service, my committee chairs, our DCMC for bringing this to our district, and District 18 for the amazing lunch yesterday. // District 90 is looking forward to hosting you all at the Post-Conference on May 16 in Vacaville. // We had about 43% fewer people today than on Saturday, and across both days we had 718 registered (586 in person, 132 online), including 201 first-time attendees. // I just want to express my gratitude and send good vibes to our Delegate and thank her for putting humility into action. // I sent my alternate to present my group consciences, so I ran our notes through AI and asked for 90-second, 60-second, and 30-second versions, and that worked. // I hope the General Service Conference continues to talk about extending the timeline for Agenda Topics

across the panel. // *The past Delegate sang a farewell song (a parody of Dancing Queen by ABBA): "Conference Queen" // The Delegate shared her final remarks: This is my last time in this process, and I'm both glad and sad.
